

Measure C Facts At A Glance

- Measure C passed in November 2013. Collection of funds started April 1, 2014.
- Projected to generate \$7 million in General Fund revenue annually.
- 100% has been allocated by the City Council to Police and Code Enforcement budgets.
- Guaranteed **LOCAL** funding source - every dollar stays in Antioch.
- Sunsets in 7 years, 2021.
- Has a Citizen Oversight Board.

Results so Far Police Department

- More Sworn Police Officers.
- More Community Service Officers and support staff at Police Department.
- Response time is down; Arrests are up; and Part One Crime is down.

Code Enforcement

- One additional Code Enforcement Officer.
- One new Code Enforcement support staff.
- New blight abatement team of two workers responding to graffiti, dumping and other blight issues.

MESSAGE FROM CITY MANAGER STEVE DURAN

Measure C has now been in effect for over two years and collections have exceeded expectations so far. In fiscal year 2015/16, the City received \$6,821,444. That's \$1.1 million more than budgeted! Adding this to previous collections, total Measure C revenues since inception are at \$13,354,675. as of June 30, 2016. \$12,952,605 of that total has been allocated to the Police Department budget and \$402,070 to the Code Enforcement budget.

A Sales Tax Citizens' Oversight Committee, created with the passage of Measure C, ensures that this funding is spent in accordance with the Measure C ordinance and as directed by the City Council. The Committee provides the Council with an annual report, which confirmed in March 2016 that Measure C funds have been properly allocated, expended and accounted for.



Antioch Police Department recent hires



MESSAGE FROM POLICE CHIEF ALLAN CANTANDO

Since the passage of Measure C in 2013, 41 Sworn Police Officers have been hired by the City of Antioch. Due to retirements and other attrition, however, our net gain is currently 11, bringing us to 93 sworn Officers of our budgeted allocation of 102. In addition, four Community Service Officer positions and other support positions in the Police Department have been funded. In the same timeframe, Code Enforcement added one Code Enforcement Officer, bringing the total to three and, this year, added two new General Laborer positions just to focus on dumping, graffiti and other blight issues. Measure C funds have also been used to purchase equipment for Police and Code Enforcement. As of June 30, 2016, \$4,351,967 remained unspent, but is still dedicated to enhancing Police and Code Enforcement services.
