VI. BUSINESS

1. Presentation: Disc Golf, presented by Nancy Kaiser, Parks and Recreation Director and the project volunteers

Director Kaiser provided a presentation on Disc Golf that summarized the history of the Antioch project, the advocacy efforts to include disc golf as a recreational amenity, and the planning and implementation accomplished by the volunteer leadership group. Volunteer Scott Bartlebaugh spoke and further described the work of the disc golf leadership group – fundraising, course planning, and course installation. Scott stated that more work will continue and suggested that the City could coordinate additional weed and dirt removable in the future. The volunteer team and staff are discussing the possibility for a "demo day" for interested residents on Saturday, October 26, 2017.

2. Verbal Report Regarding the Timeline for Modification of Park Rules and Regulations

Staff reported that the Antioch Municipal Code has a mechanism that allows City Administration to implement park rules and regulations that are for the benefit of residents and users. Further discussion will take place with the City Attorney to apply a no smoking rule; timeline to have in place before the 2018 picnic season.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is recommended that the Parks and Recreation Commission adopt Resolution 2017/02, thereby recommending that the City of Antioch require the applicant to pay in lieu fees as defined by the City of Antioch Municipal Code to meet the park land obligations for the Wildflower Project.

DISCUSSION

The applicant, Denova Homes, Inc., has submitted a proposal for the Wildflower Station project (Project), a mixed use residential and commercial project within an overall site of approximately 23 acres. The Project is located north of the intersection of Wildflower Drive and Hillcrest Avenue. The Project will include a commercial development (10.45 acres) consisting of nine buildings along the west edge of the property fronting to Hillcrest Avenue. Residential uses would include 22 single-family homes (4.05 acres) located on the northeast edge of the property that would be adjacent to existing residences on Wildflower Drive and 98 condominiums (7.0 acres) generally between the single-family and commercial uses. The Project also includes small park/open space features, internal roadways, water quality/drainage facilities and various landscaping features (See Attachment B).

Per Municipal Code Section 9-4.1011, the Parks and Recreation Commission must make a recommendation to the Planning Commission regarding the dedication of land and/or the fees to be paid by the developer of a project to meet obligations associated with park land dedication.

The Project includes a small open space area located near the northernmost section of the proposed single-family homes and a small outdoor play structure at the southern end of the proposed multi-family dwellings. However, neither of these minor private recreation facilities meet the park dedication requirements of providing a minimum of two acres of contiguous private open space or private recreational facilities before any credit is given and therefore not eligible for credit (Section 9-4.1010 (C)).

The City's municipal code directs that subdivisions with less than 50 parcels shall meet park land obligations through payment of in lieu fees. The municipal code further states that the City may, at its discretion, require land dedication for condominium projects that include more than 50 dwellings.

Within the proposed Wildflower Station project, a combination of steep hillside terrain, the mixture of commercial, multi-family and single-family homes, and the relatively small site do not provide adequate space for a traditional park. Additionally, the total park land obligation for this project would be 1.261 acres, an area less than the minimum acceptable park size. Therefore, staff is recommending that the Project meet its park dedication requirements through payment of in lieu fees.

Section 9-4.1007 of the Municipal Code specifies the formula for calculating in lieu park land fees as follows:

Single Family Dwellings:

\$1,500 per dwelling unit

Multi-Family Dwellings:

\$950 per dwelling unit

Based upon the established in lieu fee amounts, the Project is obligated to pay \$126,100 in lieu fees to meet its park land dedication obligations. This amount is in addition to park impact fees that provide for the improvement of park facilities within the City.

RESOLUTION NO. 2017/02

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF ANTIOCH RECOMMENDING ACCEPTANCE OF IN LIEU FEES TO MEET THE PARK LAND OBLIGATION OF THE WILDFLOWER STATION PROJECT (ASSESSOR'S PARCEL NO. 051-140-002)

WHEREAS, the City of Antioch has received an application for the Wildflower Station project (Project), a subdivision that includes 22 single-family dwellings and 98 multi-family dwellings; and

WHEREAS, the City requires that subdivisions that include residential development shall dedicate land or pay in lieu fees; and

WHEREAS, the park obligation for the Wildflower project has been calculated as 1.261 acres based on the requirements of the City of Antioch Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, the density and topography of the Wildflower project do not allow for the inclusion of parks consistent with the City's adopted standards; and

WHEREAS, the total calculated park land obligation for the Project is less than the minimum park size as established by the City for purposes of park land dedication.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Park and Recreation Commission does recommend that the Wildflower Station project meet its park land dedication requirements through the payment of in lieu fees; and furthermore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Park and Recreation Commission does recommend that in lieu fees in the amount of \$126,100 be paid to the City of Antioch to meet the Project's park land dedication obligation.
